Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ of the NCA.

Last year I began my report referencing the uncertainty of our times. That uncertainty is now moving to an unsettledness in church leadership and among relationships.

I observe this in rural and city, Canada and the U.S., large and small churches. One pastor comments, "The sheep are migrating to places not on the basis of theology, but where they feel most comfortable." Many are simply disengaging from churches.

I think of Paul's instructions to put on the whole armor of God (Ephesians 6) to prepare for these spiritual battles. This invitation comes after he writes about Who Christ is, how He has broken down the dividing wall through the cross and how we can now relate to each other as part of the one body, when we share Christ.

After his call to be strong and stand in the Lord, fully equipped for this spiritual battle, Paul concludes with these personal words: . . . praying at all times in the Spirit, with all prayer and supplication. To that end keep alert with all perseverance, making supplication for all the saints, and also for me, that words may be given to me in opening my mouth boldly to proclaim the mystery of the gospel. Ephesians 6:18-19

Paul calls his readers to be discerning and to be praying, for each other and for him. This discernment and prayer are together. Note he requests, while still in chains, that they pray that he boldly proclaim the mystery of the good news. Three questions:

Are we discerning the spiritual context of our differences? How are we praying for each other? With whom are we intentionally proclaiming the good news that Jesus is King?

Where the evil one is active, the Holy Spirit is also moving. Let us not live in fear, but wisely and joyfully as God's sons and daughters through Christ, the incarnate Son of God, even now present by the Holy Spirit.

I continue to interact in multiple ways with pastors, church leadership and our NCA churches as we learn to walk together with Christ in these unsettled times. Zoom calls are one example. 2022 guests include Sam Nikkel (resiliency in ministry), Kerry Bender (an update on where God is active internationally), Ron Klassen (what keeps him going in rural ministry), Odessa Seminary president Dr. Olexsandr Geychenko (update on praying for Ukraine) and Randy Schmor (how churches can partner cross-culturally).

How are we using these times as opportunities to walk in dependence on the Lord, while sharing about how He is transforming us? God is inviting us to join Him on the mission He is already on all around us. How are we equipping and empowering others to begin something different, something that may be new to us? October is Pastor Appreciation Month. Please show your gratitude to God by honoring them.

There are no pastoral additions to the NCA in the last twelve months, but there are changes. **Anamoose and Martin**, both without pastors, are planning to share an interim. Danelle Olson served Anamoose over two decades. Martin's pastor to step away from ministry for the present. **Wishek** continues to search, but is being served by Neal Stockeland. **Grand Forks**, led by Mike Eddy (IPM), recently posted for a lead pastor. **Herreid** is also looking, as Keith Hall concludes as pastor at the end of the month. **Minot and Jamestown** are both seeking staff positions. Barry Seifert retired from his associate position in Minot. Dave Gallagher, associate at Century, proceeded us to glory with Jesus. **Herreid** celebrated 125 years of ministry this summer, while **Missio** is now in their new home. **White Cross** is thriving. Lives continue to be impacted through the ministry of **Crystal Springs Camp**. **Aberdeen** (Calvary Baptist) disbanded last October and has distributed assets, with over \$40K going to the NCA.

To those who serve on the NCA Executive, thank you for your faithful service. I've not added as many articles to the NPR website (https://npregion.org) as in previous years, yet I invite you to check it out for a number of ministry resources. To all of our churches, thank you for your continued prayers, financial support and encouragement. How are you purposely seeking opportunities to be on mission with other NCA churches?

NAB Association Report Fall 2022 - North Central Association: Executive Director Dr. Harry Kelm

I greet you with great joy as I consider the abiding partnership that the North Central Association churches have with one another and with the North American Baptist Conference (NAB). We acknowledge that we are the body of Jesus Christ together. We believe that in God we can do more things together than alone. God continues to draw people to himself and to work His reconciliation and peace in this world.

The NAB continues to have many opportunities to minister and serve. The focus of our ministry is summed up in four end goals. We have had these end goals since 2012.

- 1. Training leaders and churches to missionally reach their communities for Jesus Christ. God is calling us to live out His mission by loving our neighbor as ourselves.
- 2. Assisting leaders and churches to engage their communities cross-culturally. We believe that God is raising a church of many people and nations.
- 3. Growing leaders by specifically raising up new leaders for the church. We believe that God is at work in the lives of emerging leaders.
- 4. Recruiting, sending, and supporting international missionaries. We believe God has called us to work alongside the global church and to reach those who do not yet know Jesus as Savior.

I have never been more convinced that these four end goals are what God is asking us to strategically pursue as a conference of churches. At the core of these end goals is engaging in the great commandment that Jesus gave to His followers in Matthew 22 which is to love God with all of our heart, soul and mind and to love our neighbors as ourselves. Let me share some of things that God is doing:

- We are resuming our in-person missional training. This has been a focus of the NAB for the past 10 years. In Blue Ocean, Discovery Weekends, Ethos Training and Bonfire we are challenging churches and church leaders to reach the lost in their community for Jesus. Our intention is to multiply this missional training in the coming years by having churches gather into missional cohorts to speak into various aspects of missional initiatives churches training other churches.
- We are continuing to work with 28 church plants. Our church plants are challenged to be missional communities. They are committed to seeing lives changed through the love of Jesus lived and expressed. As a part of a church planting, the NAB offers the assessment of planters and churches. The NAB offers training and residency opportunities. The NAB offers equipping and support through yearly church planting summits and the coaching of church planters.
- The NAB is also continuing to support the revitalization and the re-starting of churches. This is becoming a larger and larger priority.
- This past year the NAB sponsored a church planting conference in Mexico for churches being started in the Hispanics for Christ partnership. These church plants are found in Mexico and in South America. Hispanics for Christ is working with 200 churches in North and South America.
- In our cross-cultural partnerships we are having various study groups that the Vice President of Cross Cultural Engagement Wayne Stapleton is offering. Wayne is developing relationships and strategically determining how to help churches move to greater cross-cultural involvements.



- A number of NAB churches are broadening their cross-cultural engagement by adding diverse staff, reaching out pastor to pastor and church to church in cross-cultural relationships. We are seeing churches develop cross cultural ministries and celebrate diversity found in their church.
- When it comes to Emerging Leader Engagement, we had "The Gathering" this past summer. This event had not happened for some time because of the impact of Covid. In "The Gathering", Middle School and High School students were involved in missional outreach in various ministries in Southern California. It was a great event.
- We are seeking to more assertively move into emerging leader engagement. This involves offering more regional connections to young leaders as study and support groups. We are also seeking to offer resources in webinars. One component of this will be to also provide resources to Youth Pastors, web-based and inperson.
- We are thankful for the faithful ministry of our 37 missionaries. The Mbingo hydro-electric dam has opened the door to many opportunities. Mbingo Hospital is a teaching hospital in West Africa. The newest possibility is to become a leader in radiation cancer treatment in Africa.
- We are seeing more and more churches connecting in Cameroon with programs that are seeking to minister to people in crisis as a result of the civil war in Cameroon. Things like skill training for displaced young adults, and trauma and healing workshops because of the violence and abuse happening. These programs specifically resonate with individual churches.
- The ministry in Brazil is focused on pastoral training. We are seeing a great application of Kairos University (formerly Sioux Falls Seminary) into the training of the seminary in Brazil. The reach of this training is growing because of the hybrid model of virtual and in-person training.
- In the Philippines the NAB has also been focused on pastoral training. This has been hampered by Covid but it continues. Students are being trained but there have been limits to travel.
- Our ministry in Japan is focused on personal evangelism in English speaking training. This is again restarting
 after Covid. We are also involved in church planting. We are seeing a greater interest in people wanting to be
 involved in ministry in Japan.
- Our presence in Eastern Europe has given us an opportunity to funnel resources to the hurting people of Ukraine. Camp Falcon Rock has opened itself to refugees. The seminary in Odessa has been a place where we have been able to send relief funds. The third place where we have assisted with resources is through our missionaries working within the ministry to the Roma people. This has enabled individual churches to reach out to refugees.
- We have continued the ministry of Camp Falcon Rock to the children and people of Hungarian Baptists in Romania. The ministry to the Roma also continues on.

There are many more things happening. I am humbled to be a part of the work of the NAB. Thank you for your faithful partnership. Thank you for giving and we prayerfully ask that you continue giving.

Missio Church Update: Josh Huseby

I have always loved to fly. Since I was a kid, I was fascinated with airplanes and one day hoped to be a pilot. Well, the dream to fly an airplane never came true and have found myself on a very different and unexpected journey in life. Planting a church was not something I ever saw myself doing and more than once have asked God if he made a mistake in choosing me to be a church planter!

Over the years, I have read many books on church planting and I have friends that have planted churches around the US. From what I have learned, a typical church plants start with a worship service and then build ministries around that as the centerpiece. From a "normal" church plant, we did it backwards. We started with outreach and serving in our community to get to know people who are not yet following Jesus.

Our first missional community grew and multiplied into three missional communities. We put a lot of focus and energy into these groups because we believe they are the primary vehicle for making disciples. For a season we held monthly worship gatherings at Bismarck High School, and we would hang out at Century Baptist on most Sundays at one of their worship gatherings. We intentionally took our time in launching a weekly worship gathering because we knew it could take all the gravity from what we were trying to establish in rhythms of outreach and serving in the community.

In 2021, Century Baptist purchased a warehouse building that needed major renovations to be used as an assembly space. The For the City Center will be home for Missio as well as White Cross and the Ministry Center. Because the city codes required more changes to meet occupancy than we initially thought, the timeline for construction has taken longer too. Missio was feeling the pinch of growing pains. Since we felt the need to launch weekend gatherings, we decided to do that beginning in February of this year in a rented space called "The Hub."

On October 5, occupancy of the building was granted from the city and we are now able to meet in the new building! We are just a few weeks in and loving the space. Our average attendance is around 90 at our Sunday gatherings and we continue to meet more and more people each week.

Beyond those that attend on Sundays, we have many people of peace that don't yet follow Jesus leaning into relationships with Missio folks. We hope to see more people baptized in the coming days and we trust God is at work in the hearts of those that we have developed relationships with. We believe that the Holy Spirit is at work in our city and that we get to partner with him in what he is already doing.

We are grateful for the new building, but we often need to remind ourselves that the church is not a building, it's a people. Our main focus is living as a family of servant missionaries in our city. We are partnering with local schools and developing relationships with people who don't yet know Jesus. There are so many opportunities to reach out to people who are hurting and need the gospel.

I think planting a church is a bit like flying. It requires courage, risk and trusting the Holy Spirit to help us get airborne. I often use the analogy with our leadership team that we are still assembling the airplane while it is going down the runway. We don't have all the pieces attached and we don't even know for sure how to fly this thing but we are feeling the lift and excitement as we pick up speed. God is good and leading us in this amazing adventure of church planting for the advancement of His Kingdom!

One of the most powerful gifts we experience through Kairos is the way it has drawn others into the journey of theological education. Enrollment in seminaries has been declining for several decades and stemming this tide is essential for an institution to thrive.

Enrollment consultants always tell you that your current students are the best recruiters of new students. I remember sitting in enrollment management meetings over the years racking our brains trying to figure out how to draw on current students to recruit new students without violating the recruiting guidelines related to hiring students. But we were always overlooking the obvious. It wasn't so much that we needed to strategize how to encourage students to recruit, but rather we needed to provide our students with such a great experience that they couldn't stop talking about it. When students are having a good experience, they will tell their friends. If they are not having a good experience, they will also tell their friends. When you focus on giving students an educational journey they can't stop talking about, there is no need to strategize about recruitment.

Kairos is a testimony to this truth. In the nearly 10 years Kairos has been going, we have not spent any time on recruiting. Instead, all our time has been focused on seeing that each student's educational journey is the most affordable, accessible, relevant, and faithful experience for their context and call. Doing so has turned our students into recruiters and, more so, into such advocates of theological education that many others who would have never considered theological education not only thought about it but enrolled.

For recent Kairos graduate Drew Steinhart, the impact of his journey through Kairos reached many. Far from impacting just him, or even his mentor team, Kairos impacted his entire community of faith.

Drew serves as the Executive Pastor of Teaching and Campus Development and as the Williams Campus Pastor at Heartland Community Church in Medina, Ohio.

Here's how Drew describes what he saw happen at Heartland as the church community began to engage Kairos.

"Over the past four years, we have watched the possibility of accessible and affordable theological education ripple across our church in some wonderful and unexpected ways. While church staff were the first to participate in the program, elders, key volunteers, and other lay people have quickly followed."


Drew told me the story of Dave, an elder in his church, who is a successful and experienced business leader. Dave was surprised to sense God stirring within him a desire for theological education. Dave realized that perhaps God wanted Him to stretch himself for the sake of strengthening Heartland's Servant Leader Team (elder/deacon).

Drew also told me about a man in his church who had several adult children. He found himself faced with one of his youngest children asking to change her career path during her freshman year of undergraduate studies. He was skeptical and nervous – trading in a lifelong dream of a career in medicine for a career in ministry? That felt risky!

However, he came to see that the Kairos Project provided a tangible and affordable path for his daughter to explore theological training while retaining the flexibility to live at home, work part time, and stay involved at the local church that had been such a key part of her formation.

Through the Kairos Training in Spiritual Direction program, Drew said,

"Heartland's lay people have experienced the gift of meeting with a spiritual director. While many have no clue that Kairos is what has made spiritual direction more easily accessible within our congregation, there are now several individuals who are being



encouraged to pay attention to what God is doing in the details of their lives through fellow lay people who have been trained through Kairos."

According to Drew, "The primary way Kairos has changed the culture of Heartland Community Church is by expanding our vision of who can take part in theological education. We have successful business owners, retired men and women, 18-year-olds, folks who have their master's degrees in other fields, adults who never got bachelor's degrees – all pursuing theological training because of Kairos."

Beginning with Drew, just one Kairos student, God has not only opened doors for a multitude of others to experience the impact of theological education, but He is also in the process of impacting the culture of an entire community of faith.

Kairos University offers degree programs at the bachelor's, master's, and doctoral levels. Currently, the growing global network of the Kairos Project has approximately 4000 students, mentors, and partners worldwide in over 60 countries and serving in over 70 denominations. God is at work in amazing ways as students, graduates, mentors, and partners flourish in their vocations and impact their communities through their journeys of theological education.

Bookkeeping Service for Churches (NEW!)



Greetings from Baptist Health & Rehab/Prairie Pointe Assisted Living!

As you can tell from this greeting, our name has changed. Prairie Pointe Assisted Living's name remains the same, but Baptist Health Care Center has changed to Baptist Health & Rehab. The rehabilitation work at our facility has become such a major part of what we do that we wanted that word to be in our name. While many of our residents come for a long-term stay, the majority of new admits to our facility come for 100 days or less. This past year we welcomed 125 new residents, and many of them came for our rehabilitation. Despite coming off of a pandemic, we have been blessed with remaining 98% of capacity.

During the past year we welcomed a new Director of Nursing (D.O.N.) this year. Clarissa Arlt, our former Quality Assurance nurse, began as our new D.O.N. on December 7th. Clarissa has served as a nurse both at Baptist Health & Rehab and at Elim Care in Fargo before she and her husband moved to Bismarck.

Deanna Berg continues leading us as our Administrator after a very difficult year personally. Deanna lost both of her parents last year with their deaths being just a couple of months apart. Since her parents were farmers, Deanna also busy arranging for an auction sale to sell off the farm machinery.

Since Burleigh County is in the red zone, Covid testing is occurring twice per week now. We just arranged for Covid test #172 since this all began.

In our chapel ministry Rev. Perry Schnabel, (our ass't chaplain) has been leading a worship service every Thursday morning for the residents at Prairie Pointe Assisted Living. Rev. Merle Hoots (chaplain) leads a Bible Study on Wednesdays and a worship service each Sunday morning at 10:00 in the chapel. Following the protocol of Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), we are permitted to have the residents come into the chapel for worship. The residents however, need to wear masks and seat 6 feet apart and we are not allowed to have the residents sing. Family members are also not allowed to join us for worship. That's where we remain to this day.

Steps are being taken to get volunteers trained and background checks done, so that we can start to have volunteer helpers during the Sunday worship services and to have St. Anne's Catholic Parish return to offer a live catholic mass on a weekday.

We greatly appreciate each of you praying for us and supporting us.
